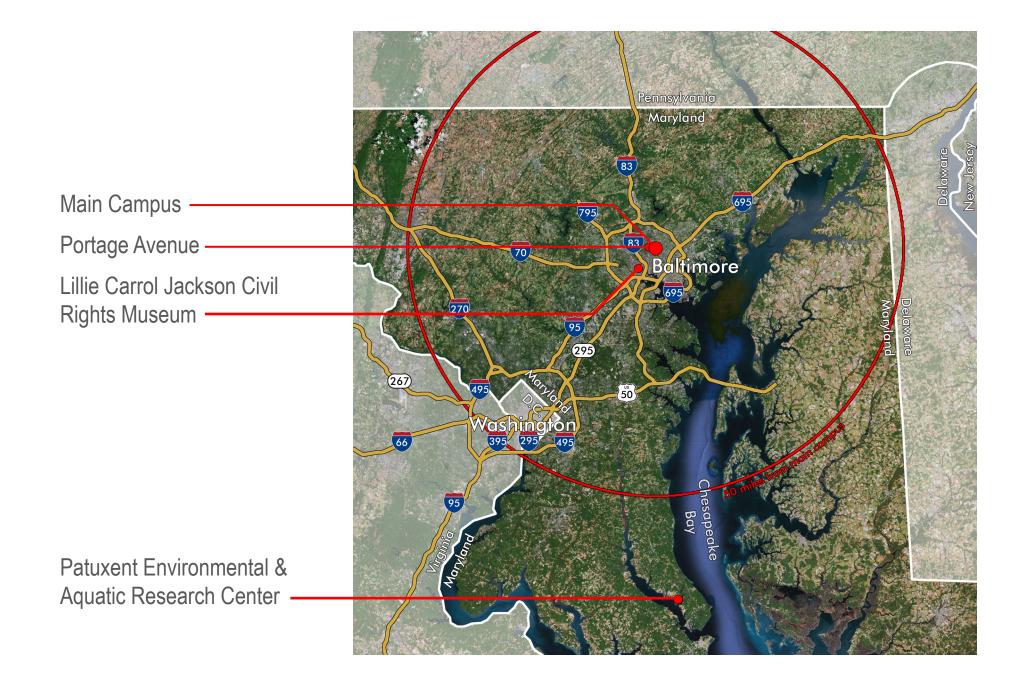

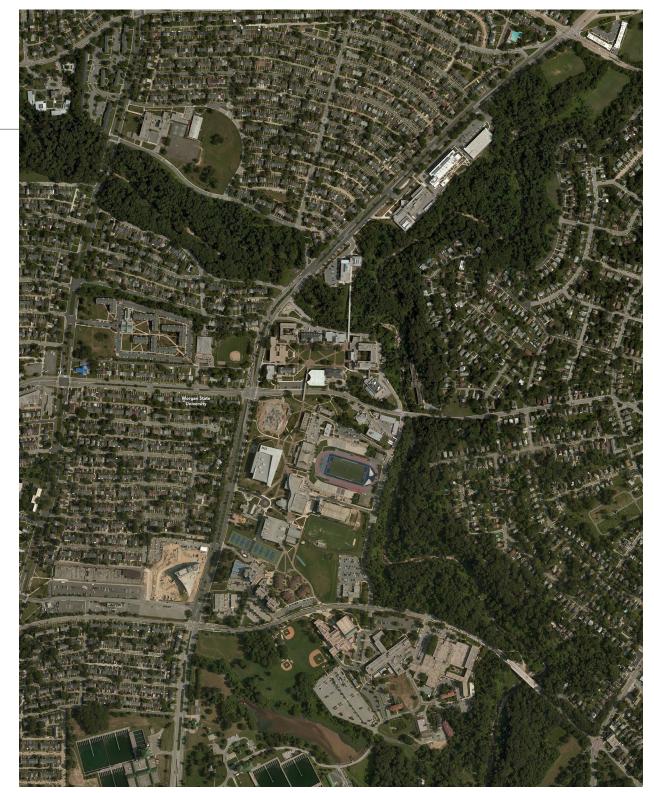


Regional Context

- Campus density



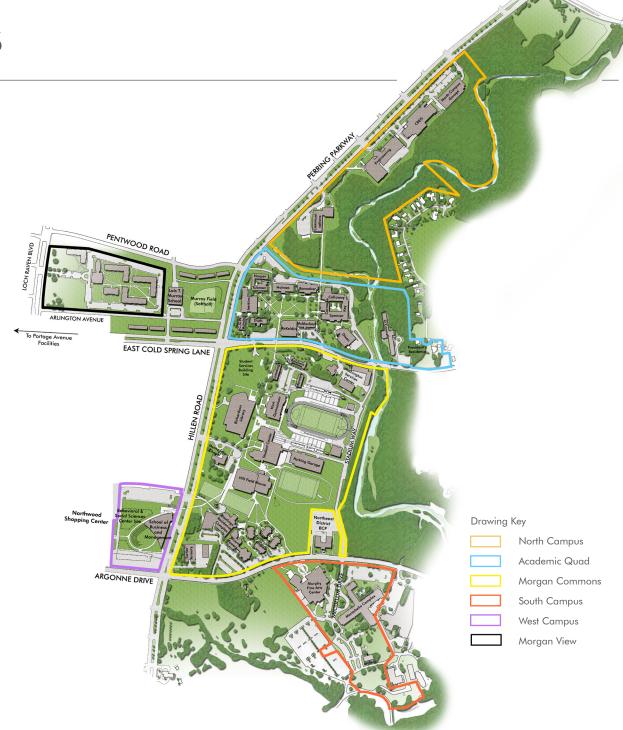
Natural Features

- Limited open green space



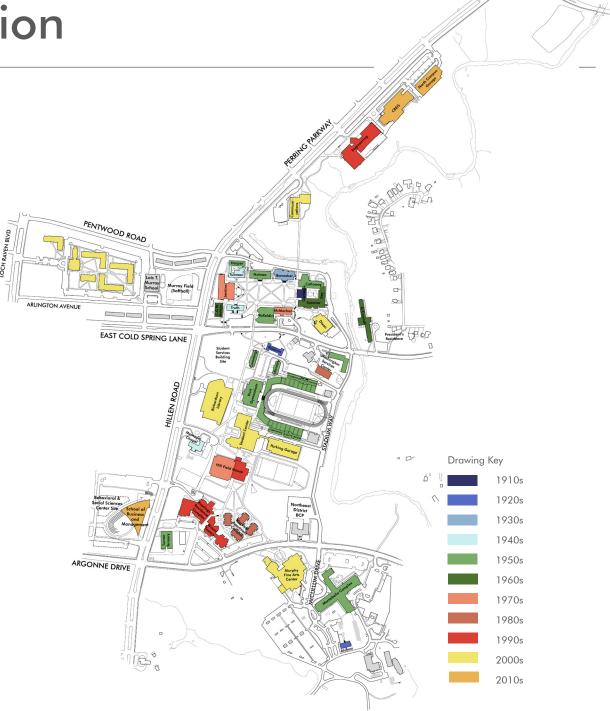

Historic Preservation

- Campus named a National Treasure in 2016
- Carnegie Hall (1919)
 - Oldest academic building, built with a grant from Andrew Carnegie
- National Registry of Historic Places:
 - Alumni House (1922)
 - University Memorial Chapel (1941)



The Plan - Goals

- Respond to the initiatives in the University's Strategic Plan and the growth in student population;
- Increase access to a diverse group of students relative to their academic preparation, socioeconomic background, and ethnicity;
- Further develop, define, and improve campus connectivity and organization, including the preservation, improvement, and access to outdoor green spaces;
- Correct the long-term deficiencies in facilities with the goal of gaining international prominence in its areas of strength;
- Develop efficient allocation of space for all programs and create guidelines for future space assignments;
- Address evolving academic trends, the impact of technology on academic programs, changing
 instructional delivery methods, the impact of online education, and the growing significance of research;
- Develop a sustainable plan regarding ecological impacts, economic benefits, and equal access to all available resources.

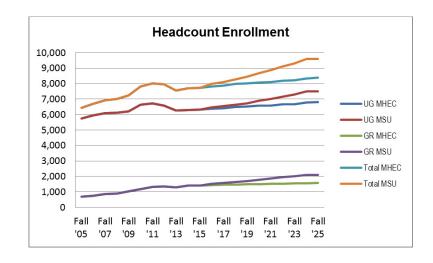
Institutional Demographics

Headcount Enrollment

- 20% increase from 2005 to 2015
- 24% projected increase over next 10 years
- 9,582 headcount by 2025

- Striving to attain R2: Doctoral University -Higher research activity



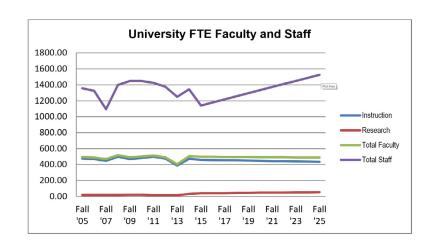

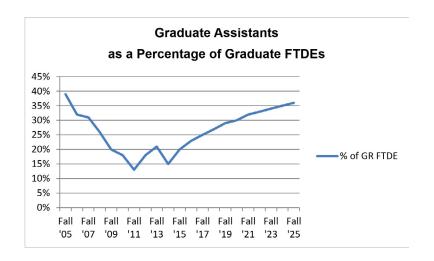
Faculty

- Currently ~ 500 FTE faculty
- Current student to faculty ratio is 15:1
- Proposed ratio is 17:1
- Increase research faculty
- Total projected growth of 7% to 536 FTE

Graduate Assistants

- 35% increase from 2005 to 2015
- But, decrease as a percentage of graduate FTDEs
- Increasing additional 30% to 211 graduate assistants

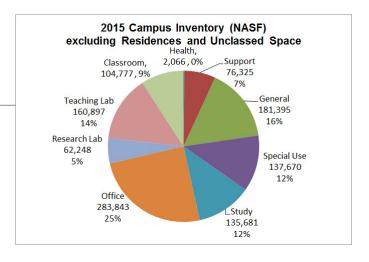

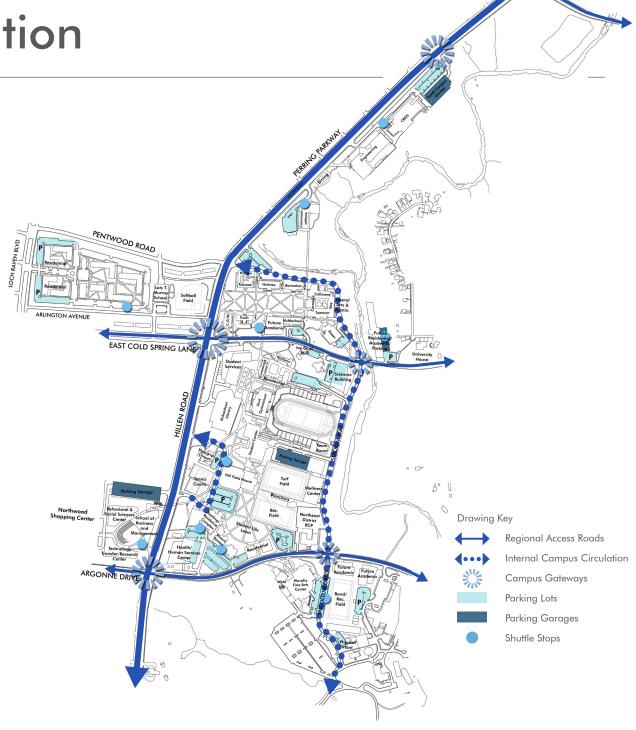

Sustainable Design

- Advance the Climate Neutrality Committee
- Create and enforce sustainability goals
 - Co-curricular sustainability education
 - Building/facilities implementation
 - LEED Silver+ for all new construction (LEED Gold on CBEIS and School of Business and Management)
 - Building operations and maintenance to meed LEED for Existing Buildings
 - Reduce water consumption and continue green cleaning service
 - Dining Service: local food sourcing, increase organic food, Fair Trade
 - Energy and climate: reduce energy use, utilize renewable energy, and reduce greenhouse emissions
 - Grounds: green roofs, climate sensitive planting, and lower maintenance
 - Materials, recycling, and waste minimization
 - Purchasing: source energy star products, EPEAT silver registered products, selective paper products
 - Coordinate with vendors
 - Transportation: bicycle friendly campus, shared vehicle resources, and limit greenhouse emissions

Goal 1: Enhancing Student Success

- Continue advances from previous Facilities Master Plans
- Incorporate 21st Century instructional technologies and pedagogies
 - Moving toward in increase in smart classrooms and labs
 - Provide space for collaborative learning flexibility in remaining traditional classrooms
 - Seminar rooms, case classrooms, and problem-based classrooms
 - Discipline-based, experiential learning environments
 - Provide various types of collaboration space for students and faculty
- Planning to meet space needs for health professions, sciences, and humanities
- Enhance space for student support, including Internal Affairs Division and Honors Program
- Plan for student development outside of academics
 - New Wellness and Safety Center
 - Expand and improve living/learning environments
 - Improve outdoor spaces for athletics, recreation, and general unassigned use

- Goal 2: Enhancing Morgan's Status as a Doctoral Research University
 - Significant advances in STEM research environment Sciences Building
 - Research space for biology and chemistry
 - Shared bio-safety labs, animal facilities, and research greenhouse
 - New facilities enable improvements through renovation
 - Carter-Grant-Wilson envisioned as new Institute for Urban Research and School of Graduate Studies
 - New Technology Transfer Center
 - Co-locate Research and Economic Development Division
 - Provide increased research infrastructure

- Goal 3: Improving and Sustaining Morgan's Infrastructure and Operational Processes
 - New Student Services Center
 - Provide timely and efficient student services
 - Improve recruitment, retention, and graduation rates
 - Graduate Studies in Carter-Grant-Wilson will support same purpose for graduate students
 - Improve facilities for administrative support
 - Senior Administration, Human Resources, Finance and Accounting, Public Safety, etc.
 - Improve facilities for facilities support
 - Physical Plant, Procurement and Property Control, Design and Construction, Facilities Planning, etc.

Goal 4: Growing Morgan's Resources

- Create a unified vision for campus development
- Plan for improved academic, administrative, and student life facilities
- Remove facilities that do not meet current needs, technology, or accessibility standards
- Build enthusiasm for resource commitment among all constituencies

- Goal 5: Engaging with the Community
 - Create an open and inviting campus
 - Improve campus gateways, signage, and wayfinding
 - Open Academic Quad to public (demolition of Jenkins Hall) with new formal Gateway
 - Create welcoming facilities for the public, e.g. Student Success Center, Wellness and Safety Center, and the Information Center
 - Create opportunities for increased community outreach
 - Occupant health professions, including counseling
 - Community greenhouse and gardens
 - Meeting facilities that support community events
 - Support the Morgan Mile
 - New facilities to support Academic Outreach and Engagement in Key Hall
