Angela Davis, social activist



Angela Davis, a proud feminist, Black Panther, prominent social activist, and retired University of California philosophy professor, majored in philosophy at Brandeis University and worked under Herbert Marcuse. These studies strongly influenced her campaigns against racism, capitalist inequalities, sexism, and anti-LGBTQ sentiment.

Phil Jackson, NBA coach



Phil Jackson, legendary Chicago Bulls and Los Angeles Lakers coach, majored in philosophy at the University of North Dakota. Players, contemporaries, administrators, and fans call him "The Zen Master." Inquiries into Eastern philosophy helped him develop the coaching style that won him 11 championships as a coach, added to the two earned as a player. He even published a book, *Sacred Hoops*, about how sport and philosophy interplay in his mind.

Thurgood Marshall, U.S. Supreme Court Justice



Born in Baltimore, Maryland, Thurgood Marshall was the great-grandson of a slave. He studied literature and philosophy at Lincoln University. He founded the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund. He argued many civil rights cases, most famously *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka* in 1954. In 1967 he became the first African American Supreme Court Justice.

George Soros, billionaire banker



"The Man Who Broke the Bank of England" completed his Bachelor of Science degree in philosophy in 1952 at the London School of Economics. He scored an entry-level job at graduation at Singer & Friedlander, a bank. George Soros applied the critical and analytical skills students of philosophy learn to the world of finance to eventually become up a billionaire, launching his own hedge fund and investment firm.

Ricky Gervais, actor and comedian



The famous comedian of TV shows *Extras* and *The Office* majored in philosophy at University College London. Fans can certainly see the humorous benefits of devoting time, energy, and money towards the philosophical arts if pursuing an entertainment career.

Bruce Lee martial artist and filmmaker



Bruce Lee studied philosophy extensively at University of Washington and beyond. He read the *Tao Te Ching* and was inspired by the concept of *wu wei*, action accomplishing its purpose in accordance with the natures of things and events. He frequently touted philosophy's role in shaping both his acting and his athletics.

Peter Thiel, founder of Pay Pal



Thiel got his undergraduate degree in 20th Century Philosophy at Stanford in 1989, and a law degree in 1992. Thiel was the co-founder and CEO of PayPal. He currently serves as president of Clarium Capital, and as a managing partner at venture capital firm, the Founder's Fund. He was also the first outside investor in Facebook.

Elena Kagan U.S. Supreme Court Justice



Justice Kagan attended Princeton University where she wrote a senior thesis on the history of American radicalism in the hope of clarifying her own political ideas. She received a fellowship and went to England for a year to study philosophy at Worcester College at Oxford, where she received a Masters of Philosophy degree. She was nominated to the bench by President Obama in May, 2010.


